As we train kids to receive knowledge that forms and shapes them, let us remember the God's divine power has given our kids everything they need for life and godliness May he help us to grow in him.



With only a few weeks left on our Extra Mural calendar, lets continue to conduct ourselves in a godly manner and thank God for our learners' skills, abilities and talents.



PLAYERS CODE OF CONDUCT

- □ Thank God for my talent, and ask Him to develop me to my full potential.
- □ To play in such a way that God is glorified.
- Play by the rules.
- Never argue with an official. If you disagree, have your captain, coach or manager approach the official during a break or after the match.
- □ Control your temper. Verbal abuse of officials and 'sledging' other players, deliberately distracting or provoking an opponent are unacceptable behaviour in any sport.

- □ Treat all participants in your sport as you would like to be treated.
- Co-operate with your coach, team-mates and opponents. Without them there would be no competition.
- Participate for your own enjoyment and benefit, not just to please your parents and coach.
- Respect the rights, dignity and worth of all participants regardless of their gender, ability, cultural background or religion.

SPECTATOR'S CODE OF BEHAVIOUR

- Pray for God to guide the coaching staff.
- □ To ask God for patience and discernment with regard to all aspects of the game.
- Respect the coach's team selection.
- Never criticise the coach in front of players or other spectators, wait for an appropriate time to speak to the coach or speak to the co-ordinators.
- Remember that young people participate in sport for their enjoyment and benefit, lets work together to keep it fun.



- □ Applaud good performance and efforts from all individuals and teams. Congratulate all participants on their performance regardless of the games outcome.
- Respect the decision of officials and teach young people to do the same.
- Never ridicule or scold a young player for making a mistake. Positive comments are motivational.
- □ Condemn the use of violence in a constructive manner, whether it is spectators, coaches, officials and players.
- □ Encourage players to follow the rules and the official's decisions.
- Do not use abusive language, 'sledge' or harass players, coaches or officials.
- □ Respect the rights, dignity and worth of every young person regardless of their gender, ability, cultural background or religion.


