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From the Principal's desk

The Minister of Education, Mrs. Angie Motshekga, delivered a speech on Sunday 5 July, where she summarized the state of schooling in the pandemic since reopening. There were a number of extremely helpful bits of information for us as parents in her speech.

She stated that "since our learners returned to school, nine hundred and sixty-eight (968) of the twenty-five thousand, seven hundred and sixty-two (25 762) schools, were closed and reopened. This is 3,75% of the total number of public and independent schools in our country."

She further added that "two thousand, seven hundred and forty (2 740) teachers, of the total number of about four hundred and forty thousand (440 000) teachers, were infected by the virus. This is equivalent to 0,6% of the entire teacher population in our country."

"In the same period, one thousand, two hundred and sixty (1 260) learners were infected by the virus." It should tell us something about the science of the transmission of this virus that, even though there are almost 30 times more students than there are teachers in our country, the number of students being infected is less than half of that of teacher infections. This seems to confirm what the scientists have been telling us all along that children are much less susceptible to Coronavirus infection than adults. This means that zero point zero one percent (0.01%) of our learners, were infected by the virus. It is further not possible to state whether infections actually arose in schools or

originated in homes in the community, but the latter is far more likely according to available research. While "the average duration for the deep cleaning, decontamination and fumigation of schools, and the preparation of schools for the resumption of teaching and learning, is three (3) days, it should be emphasised that temporary closure of the less than four percent (4%) of schools after the school reopening, is much better than a system-wide closure over the same and even longer period of time."

Turning to the scientific basis for reopening schools, Minister Motshekga said, "we have sought and obtained advice from scientists, medical and education experts, which informs the decisions that we make on a daily basis."

"Among the experts, the understanding shifted in or around April 2020, from the virus being seen as a flu-like virus, which was spread easily by children, to the understanding that not only did young children not get infected by the Coronavirus; they were also exceptionally weak transmitters of the virus. This is in part, what prompted global bodies to call for the end of school closures, and for countries, such as South Africa, to reopen schools fairly quickly. In addition to concerns about health, wellbeing and protection from society's ills, the case for reducing learning loss is clear. The progress and improvement seen in international and national assessments in the last two decades could be erased the longer children stay out of school."

The Minister lamented that many parents have still been very wary. She said, “**the epidemiological rationale has not been well understood by the public. As a result, many parents and teachers over-estimate the personal health risks they face, which in turn, can lead to excessive risk-avoidance, which is detrimental to schooling**”.



A reminder to all our parents to log in daily to our new workplace platform where videos and photographs are being posted of our little ones working so hard and having a blast while doing it.

Thank you to all the parents for your patience and compliance to our new procedures. Welcome back and we pray for a happy and healthy term 3.



HYGIENE GUIDELINES FOR SWOP SHOP/2nd HAND SHOP

Guidelines for the management of the swop shop/2nd hand uniform shop, based on the principles set out by the NCID in the control of Covid-19.

- Surfaces of the shop to be cleaned with household detergent, then disinfected applied to surfaces before the shop opens.
- All surfaces, including floors to be disinfected at the end of each day that the shop is open.
- Gloves to be used when cleaning the surfaces and handling soiled clothing items. Proper personal hygiene to be followed before and after the use of gloves. Correct disposal of gloves to be followed.
- Parents accessing the school grounds will be required to follow the access rules as set out by the school.
- Alcohol-based hand sanitiser to be used on entry to the shop.
- No mask No entry policy to be enforced.
- Maximum of 2 people to be allowed into the shop at any given time.
- Minimum social contact and a safe distance of 1,5m between customers.
- Parents advised to please bring their own bags or packets.
- Parents are requested to please wash any items brought in for exchanging.
